Third Doses:

Drop-in staff <u>are</u> eligible for a third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine. Staff should indicate they are a health care worker when asked by the booking system and they will be able to schedule their appointment.

- Please see below to book a third dose COVID-19 vaccine:
 - Booking online via the <u>Provincial booking system</u> (effective Saturday, November 6 at 8 a.m.)
 - Booking an appointment in advance at a local <u>pharmacy</u> (some allow walk-ins.)
 Some <u>hospital vaccination clinics</u> offer third doses by appointment or drop in. Check with the pharmacy or hospital before you go.
 - Drop-in's can also schedule an onsite mobile clinic <u>online</u> or by contacting <u>SSHAcovidvaccine@toronto.ca</u> to be connected to a team lead.
 - Drop-in's can also schedule on onsite clinic through Inner City Health Associates who are administering third doses contact Celine at <u>celine.desjardins@icha-toronto.ca</u>
- When attending a clinic, frontline workers should <u>bring proof of employment</u> verifying their eligibility (e.g. employment ID badge, or a letter from your employer).

Residents Without OHIP Cards:

Residents born 2016 or earlier, without OHIP cards, may get vaccinated at any city-run clinic, <u>hospital</u> or <u>pharmacy</u> clinic offering a first, second and, if <u>eligible</u>, third/booster dose.

City Immunization Clinics

COVID-19 vaccinations are available at all <u>five city-run clinics</u> by appointment only. Residents without an OHIP card must provide a COVID ID number when making an appointment. Required Identification

For all clinics, residents must bring an acceptable form of identification with them which may include government-issued ID (including non-Canadian and expired documents) such as a driver's licence or passport, a piece of mail with your name on it, a pay stub or a student card.

Vaccine Clinics

City Immunization Clinics

- Metro Toronto Convention Centre and Woodbine Mall: Sunday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Monday to Thursday, 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. (closed Friday & Saturday)
- Cloverdale Mall, Mitchell Field Community Centre and 1940 Eglinton Ave E: Tuesday to Friday, 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. (closed Sunday & Monday)
- Starting on January 30, <u>City Immunization Clinics</u> will be accepting <u>walk-in visits</u> for COVID-19 vaccinations, while continuing with booked appointments.

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- Clinic Locations information below includes holiday hours, parking and accessibility details for City-run clinics. Use the <u>TTC Trip Planner</u> to find directions to City-run clinics.
- Residents can <u>book an appointment online</u> or call the provincial booking system at 1-833-943-3900 (TTY 1-866-797-0007). First, second and third doses are available for eligible groups.
- A health card is not needed, however individuals must bring some form of identification.
 Acceptable forms of identification include government-issued ID (including non-Canadian and expired documents) such as a driver's licence or passport, a piece of mail with your name on it, a pay stub or a student card.
- First Nations, Métis and Inuit individuals, including non-Indigenous partners and household members, are encouraged to contact <u>Indigenous-supported clinics</u>.

• Accommodations

- All City-run clinics are able to offer accommodation. Each clinic has parking near the entrance, ramps, elevators, and wheelchairs. Staff are also on site at each clinic to support as necessary. Clients who need a care provider or service animal with them will be accommodated. There are also privacy rooms available upon request.
- If you require an accommodation, alert a staff member upon arrival or at any time while at the clinic.

- Receiving vaccines for someone else is considered fraud.
- The clinic is fully **wheelchair accessible**.
- Our clinic is **multilingual**, and **privacy stations** are available.
- You are welcome to bring **up to 1 support person** with you, if required.
- First, second, third and fourth doses (Appointments are strongly recommended to minimize wait times outside in cold)
- Please let us know if you require any additional accommodations.

How to Set Up a Vaccine Clinic at Your Drop-In

Mobile Peer Ambassador Program

- "SSHA has been working closely with Toronto Shelter Network, Toronto Public Health (TPH), Social Development & Financial Administration (SDFA) and other community partners to address vaccine hesitancy and increase vaccination rates for people experiencing homelessness.
 - A new peer ambassador program has launched, led by The Neighbourhood Group. Initially, peer workers will visit shelter sector sites with identified lower vaccine uptake (those reporting <50% clients with Covid-19 vaccine first doses administered) and will align their visit with the Enhanced Mobile Operations clinic dates/times in order to capitalize on existing on-site support and immediate access to the vaccine. Shelters will also be able to request the mobile peer workers attend their sites or to support other clinics by emailing Maiesha at The Shelter Network maiesharahman.tsn@gmail.com" (City of Toronto: Shelter, Support & Housing Administration Memorandum from June 18, 2021).</p>

Inner City Health Associates (ICHA)

- How to request a mobile clinic: An authorized individual may complete and submit the <u>online</u> request form. Please ensure that your contact information is entered correctly. Submitting the form serves as confirmation of your willingness to host the mobile clinic.
- Next steps after you submit your request: TPH staff will call or email you within three business days to confirm the details of your request and any additional information required. If your request is accepted, TPH will work with you to collaboratively plan the clinic. It is expected that you will take a lead role in promoting the clinic as part of the planning process.

- To address the increasing need for diverse clinical teams that promote and administer vaccines, the Toronto Shelter Network (TSN) is collaborating with the Black Physicians' Association of Ontario (BPAO), Inner City Health Associates (ICHA), City of Toronto, and IMAGINE Clinic to deliver COVID-19 vaccine clinics staffed by Black healthcare providers.

Mandatory Vaccine Policy

News Release – August 17, 2021:

Ontario Makes COVID-19 Vaccination Policies Mandatory for High-Risk Settings

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"TORONTO — In response to evolving data around the transmissibility of the Delta variant and based on the recent experiences of other jurisdictions, the government, in consultation with the Chief Medical Officer of Health, is taking action to increase protection for our most vulnerable, including frail seniors, immunocompromised individuals and young children who are not yet eligible for vaccination. This includes making COVID-19 vaccination policies mandatory in high-risk settings, pausing the province's exit from the Roadmap to Reopen and providing third doses of the COVID-19 vaccine to vulnerable populations. The government is also expanding eligibility for the Pfizer vaccine to children born in 2009 or earlier.

To protect vulnerable patients and staff in settings where the risk of contracting and transmitting COVID-19 and the Delta variant is higher, the Chief Medical Officer of Health has issued a directive mandating hospitals and home and community care service providers to have a COVID-19 vaccination policy for employees, staff, contractors, students and volunteers, and for ambulance services to have a COVID-19 vaccination policy for paramedics. The vaccination policy must be effective no later than September 7, 2021, and at a minimum will require these individuals to provide proof of one of three things:

- Full vaccination against COVID-19;
- A medical reason for not being vaccinated against COVID-19; or
- Completion of a <u>COVID-19 vaccination educational session</u>.

Individuals who do not provide proof of full vaccination against COVID-19 will be required to undertake regular antigen testing. These settings will be required to track and report on the implementation of their policies to the provincial government. This is similar to the vaccination policy requirements currently in place for long-term care homes.

"While Ontario remains a leading jurisdiction for first and second doses administered and we have the infrastructure in place to manage outbreaks, the Delta variant is highly transmissible and the experience of other jurisdictions shows we must remain vigilant as we head into the fall," said Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "By taking additional measures in high-risk settings we will further protect our most vulnerable, safeguard hospital capacity, ensure a safe return to school and keep Ontario running."

Vaccination policies will also be implemented in other higher-risk settings such as:

- Post-secondary institutions;
- Licensed retirement homes;
- Women's shelters; and
- Congregate group homes and day programs for adults with developmental disabilities, children's treatment centres and other services for children with special needs, and licensed children's residential settings."

After speaking with someone from Toronto Public Health and with someone from the Ministry of Health on whether or not drop-ins fall under the <u>mandatory vaccination policy</u> that is set to go into effect as of <u>September 7th, 2021</u>, there has still not been very clear guidance on this. We personally think that drop-ins would fall under the "<u>Home Care and Community Services Act, 1994</u>" covered in <u>Directive #6</u>, as this includes things such as community support services (eg: meal services, adult day programs, social services, etc.), but this still remains unclear.

**Important reminder – vaccination status is considered personal health information, and must be treated as such. Sites have an obligation to store this information safely and to keep this information private from others. When collecting information about a worker's vaccination status:

- Identify ways to safeguard workers' personal health information.
- Limit information collected to the worker's name and date of vaccination for each dose.
- Keep worker vaccination information separate from their personnel file.
- Ensure personal health/vaccination information is kept in a secure manner and only used when required.

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September 1, 2021:

Direction from SSHA on a mandatory vaccine policy for drop-ins. See below:

"<u>Currently, there is no specific guidance or direction on mandatory vaccine policies for day</u> <u>time drop-in settings.</u>

Through new shelter standards directive in development, congregate living settings such as shelters and 24-hour respites will be required to have a vaccination policy, aligned with the City's new policy for City staff working in shelters. More information will be provided on this..."

"At this time, we are encouraging all of our other partner organizations to review the <u>City's</u> mandatory vaccine policy and <u>consider developing their own policy within their organizations</u> to ensure the greatest possible vaccine uptake.

We will continue to review new provincial direction related to mandatory vaccines and vaccine passports as more information is available and keep you posted as we know more about any requirements outside of shelter settings that may be applicable to drop-in settings."

September 8, 2021:

- <u>SSHA Memorandum Mandatory Vaccination Policy</u>
- The memo shared information about the City of Toronto mandatory COVID-19 Vaccination Policy for all City staff. The policy, announced on Aug 19, outlines that:
 - As of September 13, 2021, all City staff will be required to disclose and provide proof of their vaccination status. Staff who have not been vaccinated or who do not disclose their vaccination status by September 13 will be required to attend mandatory education on the benefits of vaccination. Unvaccinated staff will then need to provide proof of first dose no later than September 30.
 - As of October 30, it will be mandatory for all City staff to have received their first and second doses of a COVID-19 vaccine. The City will comply with its human rights obligations and accommodate employees who are legally entitled to accommodation.
- The memo then shared that in alignment with the City of Toronto's mandatory COVID-19 Vaccination Policy for its employees, SSHA will be releasing a Toronto Shelter Standards (TSS) and 24-Hour Respite Site Standards (TRS) directive on mandatory COVID-19 vaccination for employees of City funded Shelter and 24-hour Respite sites including 24-hour Women's Dropin services. All staff, including external contractors, will need to be fully vaccinated with a COVID-19 vaccine by October 30, 2021.

Paid Leave for Vaccination

"Ontario workers may qualify for up to <u>three days of paid sick leave</u> under provincial legislation. The pay is at regular wages, up to \$200 per day. Workers may take time off work to get vaccinated or if they have side effects from the vaccine. However, the three days are not in addition to existing paid sick days, if offered by the employer.

Employers may apply for reimbursement from the Workplace Safety Insurance Board (WSIB) for payment made under this sick leave program. The program is currently retroactive to April 19, 2021 and will end on September 25, 2021."




